Historical directory entries for Ingleby

F. White & Co's Directory of Derbyshire 1846

Ingleby, a township and small scattered village, situated at the foot of a small sandy cliff, on the south bank, and overlooking the vale of the Trent, 7 miles south from Derby, contains 855A, 3R, 33P of sandy land, including 98 acres, of woods, 27 houses, and 149 inhabitant, of whom 68 were males and 81 females; rateable value, £1,326.10s. Sir Robert Burdett is sole owner. Ingleby Hill House, a neat modern mansion, on a lofty eminence 7 1/2 miles S.W. Derby, is the seat of Sampson Massey, Esq. In the village is a remarkable Elm tree said to be upwards of 600 years old, but is now fast decaying. Feast, Sunday before old Michaelmas day.

Charities – *Mary Burdett*, by will, in 1697, desired that her executor, Sir Robert Burdett, and his heirs, should dispose of £10 yearly until he or they should lay out the sum of £200, so that the interest or profit thereof might yearly be disposed of to the poor of Foremark, Ingleby, Milton or Repton, or any of them, in clothing poor women, distributing bread on Sundays, schooling of girls, buying Bibles and Common Prayer Books, or in such other way as they should think to be the greatest charity.

Dorothy Burdett, in 1717, desired that her brothers, and, after their decease, that her kinsman, Sir Robert Burdett, and his heirs, should dispose of £10 yearly out of the rents of Hogs Hill Farm, until he or they should lay out the sum of £200, so that the yearly interest or profit thereof might be laid out or disposed of to the poor of Foremark, Ingleby, Repton, Milton (a hamlet in Repton), and Ticknall. The above sums have never been laid out in pursuance of the above Will. Sir Francis Burdett, is the owner of Hogs Hill farm, and under the direction of his agent a quantity of beef and clothing, to a much greater amount than the interest, is provided annually at Christmas, and the poor of several places interested, with the respective overseers, attend at Foremark Hall, where the meat and clothing are distributed.

INGLEBY, a township, 7 miles south from Derby, contained, in 1851, 149 inhabitants, and 886 acres of land. In the village is a remarkable elm tree, said to be 600 years old.

Notable Buildings and Monuments

Elm Farmhouse and attached buildings

Grade 11 - first listed 24 Oct 1986

18th century farmhouse, enlarged early 19th century. A welsh slate roof and two storeys high. Rubblestone and brick barn with plain tile roof attached. 1845 is carved on a brick on one of the outbuildings.

Ash Farmhouse, Main Street

Grade 11 - first listed 24 October 1986

Late 18th century / early 19th century two storey farmhouse built in red brick. The roof is plain tiled.

Ingleby Cottage, Main Street

Grade 11 - first listed 24 October 1986

17th Century pair of cottages. Now one. Rubble sandstone, timber framing with brick infil, extended in brick at the gable ends. Two storeys over a basement built into the hillside.

Viking barrow cemetery in Heath Wood, Ingleby

Scheduled Monument

First listed 3 Dec 1951 - Date of most recent amendment 29 January 1998.

These barrow cemeteries represent the traditional pagan belief of the Viking communities.

59 barrows were found in 4 distinct groups. It was first explored by Thomas xxxxxx in 1855. Would the villagers be excited at such an ancient find. Possibly. It would help to explain why I decided to do a Viking project for my GCSE instead of WW2 !!

Anchor Church

Four interconnected caves , partly formed naturally, partly carved out by hand. Mentioned back in 1648. It was a favourite haunt of Sir Francis Burdett, lord of the manor at Ingleby and Foremark. He used it as a summer dining room for picnic parties.

Kelly's Directory of 1912 describes the church:

'The church of St Saviour's is a small and plain building of stone in a debased Perpendicular style. It consists of chancel, nave and a low embattled western tower containing 4 bells. The first two dated 1698 and the others 1660 and 1662 respectively.'

'at the west end of the tower and the south exterior wall of the church are sun-dials, one of which is dated 1650.'

POPULAR FIRST NAMES

Mary - In 1871 the female population of Ingleby was 56. Meaning that girls /women called Mary accounted for 21.5% ! In that percentage is my 3x Great Grandma Mary Fearn nee Edwards born approx 1792.

Mary is seen as quite a religious name, with Mary the mother of Jesus and Mary Magdalene. According to babycentre.co.uk Mary is an English version of the Latin of Mariam or Miriam from the New Testament Greek. Meaning is 'rebellious' or going further back to ancient Egypt 'beloved'.

Nicknames are Marnie, Moll, Molly

William - In 1861 the male population of Ingleby was 69, meaning that boys / men called William accounted for 28% ! I wonder how many had nicknames, including maybe my 3x Great Grandfather?

William from the Old High German name, Willahelm. Meaning Wil 'will, desire' and helm. meaning 'helmet, protector. Sometimes described as 'with gilded helmet'. It seems a little strange that one of the most popular English names is taken from William the Conqueror who invaded England and defeated our King Harold at the infamous Battle of Hastings in 1066.

Always a popular name, however for 2019 it did not feature in the top 20 according to babycentre.co.uk

The 21st inst. will be a day long remembered even by the youngest child who shared in the Jubilee festivities of Ingleby. Remote from the ceaseless noise of busy towns, the charming, tuneful vales and sylvan shades of Ingleby inspire one with a deep feeling of peaceful rest, and tempt thither the feet of the artist, who mentally revels amid the picturesque scenes, and commands the Trent and the sun to "Stand still" on his canvas.

One would almost think that the dwellers in its ivy-clad cottages and quaint looking tenements radiant with flowers, were utterly oblivious of the doings of the great world outside their village, but Ingleby affords one out of thousands of instances where in the midst of the usual monotony and quietude of Nature's rural retreats, there exists an enthusiastic loyalty to our beloved Queen.

Mr churchwarden Stevenson and Mr Coxon some time ago determined that Ingleby should not come behind other places in keeping the Jubilee, and they decided to mark the event by giving to the men and youths some roast beef of old England and its indispensable plum pudding, and to the women and children a substantial tea.

A delightful convenient shed was placed at their disposal by Miss Ratcliff and early on Jubilee-day the cottagers brought their tables together and formed a continuous one in the shed, which was very prettily decorated for the occasion. The surrounding buildings were rendered gay with flags of various kinds, and over the gateway leading to the premises was erected an arch of evergreens and flowers from the centre of which hung a large portrait of Her Most Gracious Majesty, under which was the first line of the National Anthem.

Amongst those present were the Rev. Thomas Orrell (vicar) and Mrs. Orrell, Mr. Thomas Stephenson (churchwarden) and Mrs. Stevenson, Mr. Hellsby, Mr. and Mrs. Coxon, the Misses Ratcliff, Mr. and Mrs. Mann, with one or two unavoidable exceptions every person living in the village was present.

After dinner which took place at 12.30, the vicar (who presided) proposed the toast of the Queen, and referred to the striking contrast of 50 years ago with the present day, and showed how the gracious influence of the Sovereign had given tone and character to those around her and the country at large.

This toast was followed by the National Anthem, in which all heartily joined. Mr. Mann was called upon to give the toast of Sir Francis Burdett, who had contributed to the feast, and sent a present of very handsome prayer-books for the school children. In a well appointed speech Mr. Mann said if Ireland had such good landlords as Sir Francis we should not hear of the disturbances that afflict that country.

The Chairman proposed the toast of the before-named gentleman, who had taken an active part in providing the treat of Miss Ratcliff, who kindly allowed the use of the shed and also a field for juvenile sports; and of others who had rendered very valuable assistance, amongst whom were Mrs. Coxon, Mrs. Stephenson, Mr. and Mrs. Mann, Mrs. Pearson & c.

At five o'clock the women and children assembled for tea, and more cheerful, gay, and congenial gathering was never before witnessed in Ingleby. After tea the vicar called the children together, their parents still sitting at the tables, and ascertained if they understood the meaning of all these grand doings, and after a short address to the little ones on the Jubilee and its lessons called upon Mr. Mann to distribute some copies of the Holy Scriptures to the children, he (Mr. Mann) having kindly provided a copy for each child in the village. Medals to commemorate the Jubilee were presented to the children, and after the singing of a Jubilee ode all repaired to an adjoining field and spent the rest of the day in various games and amusements.

Thus ended the Jubilee day in Ingleby, which will never be forgotten by anyone present and capable of taking part in the rejoicings.

The Fearn

The first Fearn to appear in the records for Foremark church is the baptism of Thomas ffearn, son of Henery ffearn of Ingleby, baptized 28 March 1676.

My direct relative is Henry Fearn baptized 16 November 1683.

My 5x Great Grandfather Henry Fearn, was baptised born on 31st August 1720 and baptized 20th October 1720.

Robert was born in Ingleby and in 1841 he was working as a Farm Servant for Samuel Rooth.

Following a move to Swadlincote he eventually changed his occupation from a Agricultural Labourer, to Labourer, to Clay Miner. Working his way up to becoming the Manager of a Clay Mine by 1891.

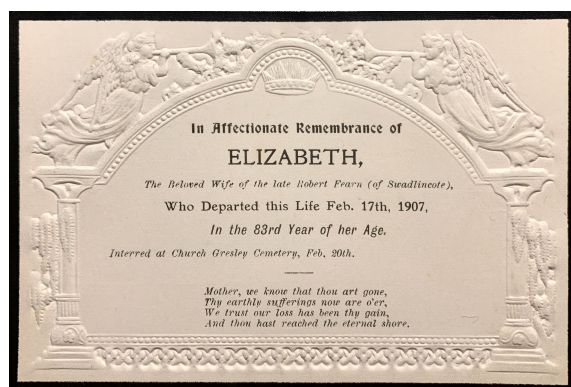

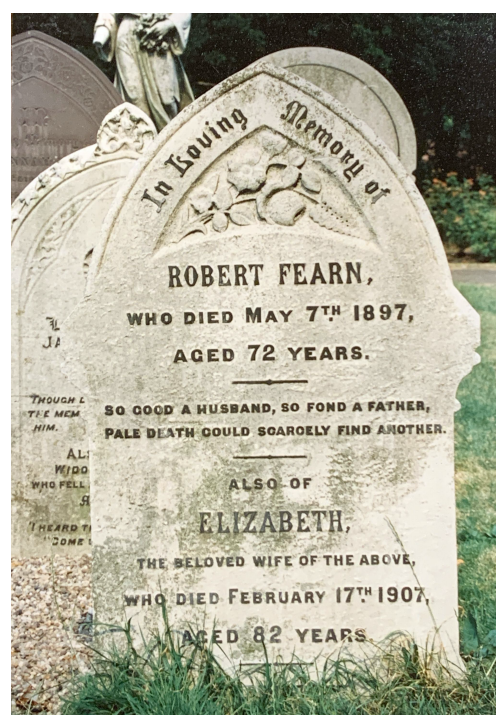
